RE: EU/NORWAY FISHERIES AGREEMENT

Dear Minister Schauvliege,

In the coming weeks you will be preparing for the negotiations between the EU and Norway regarding fishing opportunities for 2019. With the Common Fisheries Policy (CFP) deadlines for ending overfishing (by 2020) and fully implementing the Landing Obligation (LO) for all EU fleet segments (by 2019) quickly approaching, the outcomes of these negotiations are key if EU fisheries are to meet those legal obligations.

As the negotiations draw closer, we ask you to consider the following points:

- 1. To ensure that the outcome of Total Allowable Catch (TAC) negotiations meet the CFP requirements, the scientific advice from ICES should be treated as an upper limit and red line for the EU's negotiation position. Negotiating TACs in excess of the advised limits will only result in continued overfishing.
- 2. In previous years, the EU has adjusted the TACs upward for a number of stocks affected by the LO to cover previous discards that now have to be landed. Basing such adjustments ('quota top-ups') on an assumption of perfect compliance has the potential to greatly increase the risk of fishing pressure above F<sub>MSY</sub><sup>1</sup> where unreported discarding continues. While in theory the LO will be fully in force in 2019 (implying full top-ups), serious concerns remain about widespread non-compliance<sup>2</sup>. Therefore, TACs should be based on the ICES landings advice, with quota top-ups only granted to fleets that demonstrate full compliance with the LO.

3. While the EU has committed to being transparent in its decision-making, the EU-Norway negotiations have previously taken place behind closed doors, making this process rather opaque. Both the EU and Norway have formally acknowledged that broad public participation and access to information and judicial and administrative proceedings are essential to the promotion of sustainable development. Therefore, as you develop a negotiation position in the coming weeks, we encourage you to make every effort to increase the level of transparency around these negotiations, for example by inviting stakeholders to preparatory consultations and negotiations and by publishing the EU proposals.

The outcome of these negotiations has a significant impact on the ability of the EU to reach its international commitments and the CFP legal obligations. Given that this year is pivotal to the full implementation of the Landing Obligation and delivering the CFP requirement to end overfishing, we support you in adopting a negotiation position in line with the CFP's ambition of delivering healthy EU fish stocks and fisheries. We would welcome the opportunity to meet you in the coming weeks to discuss the above points in more detail.
